Investments In Trauma Informed Care Support

- Incorporating Trauma Informed Care support into our Summer Youth Program.
- Trauma Informed Care training for staff, crisis response team, and community partners.
- LPD's Surviving Onward Sessions.
- Making further investments into trauma support for students at alternative schools and adult family members affected by gun violence.



Crisis Response Adjustments

- N.E.W. is now only deployed as a part of our Crisis Response plan.
- Utilizing more *intentional partnerships* to support our Crisis Response efforts.
- Working with Global Lex to have community resources translated.





Faith-Based Alliance For Victims Support

- Immanuel Baptist Church (created a Victims Services fund)
- Porter Memorial Church (joining on N.E.W.)
- Southland (in-school mentoring at elementary schools)



Downtown Peacekeepers

- Piloted in summer of 2023
- Engage juveniles hanging out downtown between midnight and 3 am.
- Crisis Response team & community members who have received training. No one in the group is "deputized" and will not look to enforce any laws.
- Lightly engage juveniles, provide resources (Lyft cards, ride home, food, trauma support, etc.), act as a possible presence downtown, and provide LPD with crowd control if needed.

- How do we transition from an ecosystem of support to an ecosystem of opportunity?



N.O.C.A.P. Program Update

- JK-47 Productions (music recording) 5
 participants
- Evolve 2 Perform (basketball) *6 participants*
- 454 Fitness (boxing) 11 participants
- Northern Baseball league (baseball) 8 participants
- Total of 30 youth served. All either impacted by gun violence or have at least one parent who is currently incarcerated.



Supporting Survivors Survey

ONE Lexington and UK Innovation Lab conducted the survey and there were 35 participants

- 40 % lost a family member to gun violence
- 37 % had their house, vehicle or other properties hit by gun fire.
- 70 % of survivors said other family members have also been directly impacted by gun violence.
- Services Received Ranked: Utility bills, Rent/Mortgage, and Youth Programming/mentoring



Supporting Survivors Survey

- 75 % were working full time BEFORE being affected by gun violence
- 40 % were working full time AFTER being affected by gun violence
- 11 % were unemployed BEFORE being affected by gun violence
- 36 % were unemployed AFTER being affected by gun violence
- 21 % of survivors owned a home BEFORE being affected by gun violence
- 18 % of survivors owned a home AFTER being affected by gun violence



Supporting Survivors Survey: What survivors need most.

- Consistent Communication
- More Mental Health resources
- Financial Support



One Lexington Symposium Feedback

- 85 % of participants said they learned about what other community partners are doing within the One Lex strategic plan.
- 65 % of participants said that the symposium helped broaden their network of community partners.
- 77 % of participants said that the symposium helps create solidarity within community partners address youth and young adult gun violence
- 93 % of participants recommended other leaders in the community to attend this yearly symposium.
